A successful trial collection on Bruny this summer in consultation with John Ireson (Ragwort specialist) confirmed the availability of beetles in sufficient numbers to make the project viable. We are now focussed on securing all necessary approvals and targeting grant funding for a planned harvest, transfer and release next January. We see this project as vital for any significant reduction of ragwort going forward.



A big warm welcome to all the new members who have joined our branch over the last 12 months or so, keep an eye out on emails for dates for our AGM in early spring.

Working Bee March 13 - 23rd 2023- Stuart Dudgeon

Summary

The working bee group spent a total of nine days on the island and two three quarter days travelling packing and unpacking gear. Eight days were spent undertaking

weeding and heritage maintenance tasks, the ninth spent exploring the lighthouse precinct and Big Squally Cove.



Key outcomes were the prepping and completing the painting of the exterior of the fuel and paint stores and Privy, re-weeding sea spurge areas, conservation works on the Whim, commencing internal painting of the visitors house, and reworking smaller more isolated pockets of Ragwort.

Timing for the sea spurge follow up was perfect as much of it was flowering with no evidence of seed having dispersed from the 3278 plants located and removed. Given plants contained seed it was decided to build a storage container for storage of the seeding plants.

Ragwort, not surprisingly continues to expand its range with a number of new locations found on the slopes leading up to the saddle between flagstaff hills. Plants ranged from flowering only to releasing, or having released seed

The working bee group was made up of a mix of experienced and new members. This led to many good discussions on technique, and FoDi's overall role and achievements. The weather once again proved to be perfect for completion of the tasks allocated.

The group was once again warmly welcomed by the caretakers, this time Duncan and Michelle. they were keen participants on several of our weeding days and are committed to continuing to assist with our weeding efforts.

Logistics were made much easier with the majority of the supplies being ordered through Walkers supermarket and packed and weighed by Christine (A Big Thank You)

Reflections of newbie

Deal Island. What an amazing place! For me, this island has everything - the highest lighthouse in the southern hemisphere, sandy beaches, rocky coves, crystal clear waters teeming with colourful seaweeds and an amazing array of fish, wallabies (SO many wallabies), olive-green whip snakes, sea eagles, noisy cape barren geese, history and tragedy, shipwrecks and plane wrecks...and then there is the sea spurge, ragwort and horehound. I learned to identify these invasive weeds, as young plants and as plants in flower, how to tell them apart from their faux-amis (native plants that look similar), how to dig them up or pull them out, when to bag them and how to dispose of them. I also learned that I am capable of surviving 13 days without alcohol (who knew?). It was hard, but very satisfying work, expertly directed by the ever-capable Stuart Dudgeon. I felt well prepared for the working bee, having read Jon Marsden's Smedley's report from 2021/22, having looked at photos of the weeds, and having googled the history of the island. Sadly I found myself under-prepared for the evening Catan tournaments, and categorically failed to put a single win on the board.

My highlights: the team-work and camaraderie (both out in the field and in the kitchen where amazing meals were prepared) and snorkelling at Squally Cove over the wreck of the Karitane.

Unfulfilled goals: to beat Stuart at Catan and to fix the remaining sagging banners in the museum now that I've figured out how to do it (secret goal: to remove the agapanthus from the care-taker's front garden, if I'm allowed to).

I hope to come back!
